
The Original Page



The Process

It's nice to set the scene on the first page in your journal with a landscape if possible, and since the white coral sands of Belize are one of its major attractions, a beach scene was the obvious choice. I tinkered with the scene a bit, leaving out a palm tree that blocked the vista that held that marvelous leaning palm.




This view is north of San Pedro about one mile, just past the Palapa Bar.

The two photos below were taken a few yards apart to get rid of the intrusive palm. It's a good idea to take photos of scenes you sketch if you don't have time to add color on the spot. It is hard to duplicate things like that unbelievable shade of Caribbean blue-green from memory.

A landscape is usually more effective if you have some foreground details. In this case I used the gorgeous beach plant in the photo at right to add a

bit of color and variety to the foreground.
